Absolute Infidel, Absolute Nomad

For our August meeting, we will hear Michelle (Mickey) Koth and David Schafer discuss Ayaan Hirsi Ali's latest autobiographical book, "Nomad." Some of you may have read their review of her earlier book "Infidel," under the title "Absolute Infidel: The Evolution of Ayaan Hirsi Ali" in the January/February 2008 issue of *The Humanist*. Like other readers of "Infidel," including the "New Atheists," who hailed Hirsi Ali as a role model—"simply indispensable" (Sam Harris), and "a major hero of our time" (Richard Dawkins)—Mickey and David acknowledged her obvious quick intelligence and language skills and felt only admiration for her strength and courage and gratification for her emancipation from the often painful and sometimes downright destructive environments of her youth. At the same time, they deplored her stubborn and apparently ignorant insistence on a monolithic interpretation of "Islam," which led her not only to deny the very existence of moderate versions of that religion but even, in effect, to declare war on 1.5 billion Muslims. In sharp contrast to the New Atheists they concluded that "Infidel" gave a dangerously distorted view of the options available to the West in its dealings with the world Muslim community.

A lot has happened in the world, and presumably to the author, in the three years between that book and the present one. During that time Ayaan has retained her position as resident fellow of the neoconservative American Enterprise Institute. To get some idea of what passes

From New Haven: take I-91 N to exit 15 for CT-68 toward Yalesville/Durham. In 0.3 mi turn right onto CT-68. In 0.9 mi route 68 takes a left. Follow 68 for 4.2 mi, when you will turn left onto CT-17 (Main St.) Take your 2nd right (0.5 mi.) onto Haddam Quarter Rd. In 1.7 mi. turn left at Arbutus St. In 1.4 mi. bear right onto Livingston Rd. The entrance to the park

will be on your left in 0.6 mi.

From Hartford: Take I-91 S and take exit 22S on the left to merge onto CT-9 S toward Middletown. Take exit 11. At the end of the exit turn left onto CT-155 (Randolph Rd.) toward CT-17/Durham. In 0.7 mi. turn left at Millbrook Rd. (there's a traffic light and a fire station on your left). In 1.4 mi turn right onto Livingston Rd. and then turn right into the park.

From 84: Take I-691 E toward Meriden and continue onto CT-66 (eastbound). In 2.0 miles turn right onto CT-147 S. In 2.3 miles turn right and continue on CT-147 and CT-157. In 2.5 miles the road takes a sharp left (Middlefield Rd.). At the end of the road, turn right onto CT-17 (Main St.) and then take your first left onto Haddam Quarter Rd. In 1.7 mi. turn left at Arbutus St. In 1.4 mi. bear right onto Livingston Rd. Enter the park on your left in 0.6 mi.
