“The Power Of The Secular Ethic”

Hear Harvard's Humanist
Chaplain, Tom Ferrick, on
Sunday, April 21

Join us at the Unitarian Society of New Haven on Sunday, April 21 at 3:00 in the afternoon (NOTE DATE AND TIME CHANGE!) when we will present our 13th anniversary speaker, Tom Ferrick, Humanist Chaplain of Harvard University.

Tom, a former Jesuit priest, and for some time a member of the Board of Trustees of the American Humanist Association, has made Humanist history by establishing his chaplaincy at Harvard. His advance summary of his remarks on “The Power of the Secular Ethic” focuses on the crucial role of ethics in Humanism. Using a series of concrete examples, he intends to “call Humanists to a renewed loyalty to our ‘fundamentals’ and, at the same time, to an embrace of the humanistic impulse wherever, as a blade of grass, it shows itself.” He adds, “Our Secular Ethic gives us the warrant to both criticize and praise human behavior across the board. Image should reflect identity. Our projected image could use a renewal. Our convictions are worthy of respect, not instruments of insult or hatred. Our sense of a unitary humanity invites us to respect every thread of positive humanness wherever we see it.”

As is our custom, we'll start off with half an hour of informal conversation and refreshments at 3:00 p.m. At 3:20 Tom Platt will speak briefly on the popular topic “Why I Am a Humanist.” Tom Ferrick's talk will begin promptly at 3:30. Afterward there will be ample opportunity for open discussion. You won't want to miss this major address by a speaker of great eloquence. We urge you to come and bring a friend!
