Memorial for Bob Wolsch

Dr. Robert Wolsch died on August 25 in Danbury hospital where he had been for a month. He was 78.

Bob was born in Brooklyn, N.Y., son of William and Helen (Mackta) Wolsch. A U.S. Navy veteran of World War II, he taught in New York schools and universities and received his doctorate in education with a specialty in language arts from Teachers College, Columbia University.

He retired in 1989 from Western Connecticut State University

after 20 years as professor of speech communication and education, as well as humanist chaplain. Following his retirement, Bob was awarded Emeritus Professor of Communication and Theatre Arts from WCSU.

Among his awards were the Human Relations Award, Connecticut Education Association; Danbury Tercentennial for Thomas Jefferson Letters; two professional Achievement Awards from WCSU; and a citation for work with the handicapped. Bob was listed in "Who's Who in American Education."

A nationally-known advocate for literacy and teacher education, he was the author of an eight-book series, "Poetic Composition Through the Grades," and co-author with his wife, Lois, of the five-book Literacy Assured Series on language sensitivity programs for teachers and parents.

He was an active member of Phi Delta Kappa, the Speech/Language/Hearing Association, Naval Hospital Corpsman, and the Association of Religious Communities and the Cultural Commission in Danbury.

Bob was certified a Humanist Celebrant by the Humanist Society of Friends and was an active member of the American Humanist Association in addition to our own organization. Many of our members will remember the beautiful and moving ceremony when he married Bill and Kathy Lyon.

He leaves his wife, Lois Wolsch; two sons, William Wolsch and his wife, Vera, of Chatham, N.J., and Jordan Wolsch of Huntington Beach, CA; a daughter, Lisa Wolsch Rousseau and her husband, Edward, of Fairfield; a sister, Cheryl Wolsch Ennis and her husband, Irwin, of Coral Gables, FL; two grandchildren, Emily and Susan Wolsch of Chatham; and several nieces and nephews.

A memorial service will be held at 2 p.m. on Sunday, September 14, in the Presidents' Lounge, Ansell School of Business, Western Connecticut State University Westside Campus, Danbury. Important aspects of Bob's life will be represented in his eulogy by a series of speakers. Lois has asked David Schafer to represent Humanism. There will also be ample time for others to express their thoughts.
