Bertrand Russell, Humanist Hero

Our speaker this month is Rev. Douglas Peary, vice president of this association.

Doug was born and raised on a farm in northern Maine as a fundamentalist Christian. He became a Unitarian in 1972 in Springfield, Mass, where he met Joyce, who put him through college and Seminary. He studied business and philosophy and then attended Starr King School for the Ministry in Berkeley. In 1980 Doug was ordained as a UU minister, and the same year he was certified as a Humanist Minister.

In 1982 he became a Federal Labor Investigator in Oakland with the National Labor Relations Board, and he still works for the NLRB in Hartford.

Inspired by the life stories of outstanding Humanists, and finding that others were likewise inspired by them, Doug began writing the first of 17 popular "Humanist Hero" presentations in 1986, and these are now about to appear in book form.

In 1989 he became a charter member of our Humanist organization. He has served as its president, and is currently its

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Sherwin Wine in Westport "Secularism in a Religious World"

Founding chair of the Humanist Institute, founder of the Jewish Humanist Movement and recipient of the 2003 American Humanist Association Humanist of the Year Award, Rabbi Sherwin Wine will be the keynote speaker for the 36th Anniversary Lecture of the Congregation for Humanistic Judaism of Fairfield County on Friday, Dec. 5, 2003 at 8:00 pm at the Westport Woman's Club, 44 Imperial Ave. in Westport.

Rabbi Wine will address such issues as: Where is the belief in religious freedom in America headed? What does the future hold for secularism in the United States? Can there be morality without a belief in God? What should we teach our children about our religious choices and the choices of others?

Free and open to the public, the event will be preceded by a short ceremony and followed by an informal reception.
