The Implications of Naturalism

Join us on Sunday, November 20, at 7:30 p.m. when we will meet Thomas W. Clark, founder and director of the non-profit Center for Naturalism and creator of naturalism.org, among the web's most comprehensive resources on scientific naturalism and its current implications and applications. His presentation is entitled, *Tough Mind, Tender Heart: The Progressive Implications of Naturalism*.

Scientific naturalism holds that there is a single, natural world in which we are included, not a world divided into categorically natural and supernatural realms. This means we are fully physical beings; we don't have immaterial souls or contra-causal free will. Although tough-minded, this scientific understanding of ourselves has tender-hearted, progressive implications. Realizing that we are completely caused creatures, and seeing precisely how we are caused, grounds an ethics of compassion and supplies the basis for effective action. By challenging the myth of the freely willing, self-made self, naturalism gives us the motive and the means to bring about a more flourishing, non-punitive culture.

Book Discussion: *The End of Faith*

We will discuss *The End of Faith*, by Sam Harris, on Saturday, November 12, at 3:30 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden. The book is readily available in the Connecticut public library network. Please read this book before coming to the meeting.

The End of Faith: Religion, Terror and the Future of Reason by Sam Harris is a genuinely frightening book about terrorism, and the central role played by religion in justifying and rewarding it. Others blame "extremists" who "distort" the "true" message of religion. Harris goes to the root of the problem: religion itself. Even moderate religion is a menace, because it leads us to respect and "cherish the idea that certain fantastic propositions can be believed without evidence". Why do men like Bin Laden commit their hideous cruelties? The answer is that they "actually believe what they say they believe". **Read Sam Harris and wake up.**
