Stephen Jay Gould *Humanist Hero*

Join us on Monday, January 21, when Douglas Peary presents the latest chapter in his Humanist Heroes series. Rev. Peary is an ordained Unitarian Universalist Minister and a Certified Humanist Celebrant.

Stephen Jay Gould was a paleontologist at Harvard who wrote a number of books on science issues in language for the lay person. He helped develop a newer view of how evolution takes place called Punctuated Equilibrium, where evolution takes place by a more rapid change and longer periods of stability. He believed non-dogmatic religion is more about ethics and morals than about God. *Nonoverlapping Magisteria* is the title of a 1997 essay in which he explained why he believes science and religion do not need to be in conflict.

In 1981 Gould's testimony in a court case helped overturn an Arkansas State law requiring the teaching of Creation Science in public schools. In 1999 his testimony in Kansas defeated a law, which banned the teaching of evolution in public schools.

Conversations: Freedom to Vote: Protecting the Ballot

We are pleased to announce that we will watch and discuss "Freedom to Vote: Protecting the Ballot" from Season Two of the ACLU's *The Freedom Files*, by acclaimed filmmaker Robert Greenwald on Saturday, January 5, 2008. This short (26 min 46 sec) DVD has been made available by courtesy of the American Civil Liberties Union of Connecticut.

Voter ID initiatives, designed to eliminate voter impersonation, threaten to disenfranchise the 16% of the nation's elderly voters and 25% of African Americans who do not have current government-issued IDs.

"The program begins in Georgia, where a law was passed in 2005 requiring government-issued photo IDs as a condition of voting. Rosalind Lake, an Atlanta native who has been voting for 30 years, talks about the frustrations she experienced when she tried to get a photo ID. After making the trip to the Division of Motor Vehicles, she was told that she needed to produce documents that she could not afford to obtain. Lake, who is elderly and African American, chose to challenge the law because of the unconstitutional hurdles it creates for legitimate voters." — <http://www.aclu.tv/>
