“Iraq and Palestine: Historical Discourse as a Factor in Maintenance of Occupation”

Khalil Iskarous is a political activist in the New Haven area. He was born in Cairo, Egypt and has traveled in Lebanon, Palestine, Syria, Jordan, Israel, and Egypt. He participates in the immigrant rights movement, prisoner rights movement, and antiwar movement, and works on uniting the various struggles for human and civil rights. He is a member of Unidad Latina en Accion, People Against Injustice, and Connecticut United for Peace. We are pleased to announce that he will join us on Monday, February 18 at 7:30 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike as the latest distinguished speaker in our ongoing series, “Practical Pathways to Peace.”

His talk “Iraq and Palestine: Historical Discourse as a Factor in Maintenance of Occupation” will focus on how occupation is maintained and prolonged, especially in Iraq and Palestine, and how it may one day end. extensive historical discourse to justify their occupation and blaming the victims. The goal of the talk will be to lay out the discourses of power generated by the U.S. and Israel and to point out deep flaws in these narratives. It will also be claimed that successful struggle against occupation is also not built on violence alone. A discourse of liberation and agency has to replace

the discourse of power. Moreover, the construction of such a discourse of liberation is an open project.

So join us and bring a friend to 700 Hartford Turnpike on Monday, Monday, February 18. Coffee and conversation starts at 7:30 p.m. followed by this presentation at 8:00 p.m. Optionally, bring some food to share during our coffee time!
