Humanism for Young People

Join us on Monday, May 19, 2008, at 7:30 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden, when Amanda Metskas and August Brunsman will present their work with two organizations focused on bringing humanism to young people. August will talk about the Secular Student Alliance (www.secularstudents.org), an umbrella organization that supports atheist, agnostic, and humanist groups on college and high school campuses with over 130 affiliates worldwide.

Amanda will talk about Camp Quest (www.camp-quest.org), a sleepaway summer camp with six locations around North America that is aimed at kids from humanist and other nontheistic families. Both Amanda and August will talk about ways that you can get involved, as well as what their organizations do and plans for future growth. They plan an interactive session, with brief presentations followed by a lot of time for your questions.

Amanda K. Metskas is the executive director of Camp Quest, Inc. She has been involved with Camp Quest since 2003, and in 2004 joined the board of directors. Currently, Amanda focuses on providing coordination and support services to all of the Camp Quest programs. While at camp, Amanda leads activities on debate, critical thinking, and international relations. She holds an M.A. in political science from Ohio State University, and a B.A. in international relations and psychology from Brown University.
