Three Major Civil Liberties Cases, Three ACLU Clients

On Monday, September 17, at 7:30 p.m. at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden, ACLU of Connecticut Executive Director Andrew Schneider will speak on "The Clients: A Look at the Sacrifices of Individuals Who Make the ACLU's Work Possible," telling the gripping stories of ACLU clients in three major cases involving voter suppression; separation of church and state; and the challenge of Arizona's "show me your papers" anti-immigration laws.

As chief executive officer of the ACLU of Connecticut and the ACLU Foundation of Connecticut, Andrew has overall responsibility for management and operation of both organizations. Prior to coming to Connecticut, he was Executive Director of the ACLU of West Virginia for six years. During his tenure there, the affiliate's membership more than tripled and its budget quintupled in size. In West Virginia, he spearheaded a successful campaign to pass legislation to combat racial profiling. For those efforts, the NAACP honored him with their Freedom Award.

From 1998 to 2001, he served as the Development Director for the ACLU in Connecticut. His other ACLU credentials include Development Director for the ACLU of New Mexico, Campus Groups Coordinator for the ACLU National Office, Board member of the ACLU of

Global Warming: The Facts And The Issues

A Discussion With Henry Auer

Join us 4:00 p.m. at USNH on Saturday, September 29, when Henry Auer will speak on global warming. Henry will give an informal presentation open for discussion with participants. This meeting is intended especially for those without a scientific background. Henry will introduce the greenhouse effect and discuss whether recent warming is man-made. In addition, Henry will cover economic consequences of rapid warming. The meeting will include questions and answers and a group discussion. Henry believes it is important to act to overcome the bitter political stalemate that immobilizes the federal government on this and related issues. Henry is a seasoned scientist with many years in research and development, both in the biotechnology industry, and earlier, as a medical school faculty member. Most recently, until he retired in 2010, he was a patent agent focusing on biotechnology. Since 2010, Henry has become active in global warming and related environmental issues, including publishing his Global Warming Blog at http://warmgloblog.blogspot.com. Henry has an A.B. in chemistry from Princeton, and he earned his Ph.D. in biochemistry from Harvard.

The meeting will start with coffee and snacks from 4:00 p.m. until 4:30 p.m., which will be followed by Henry's presentation and a group discussion. You are encouraged to bring a snack to share.
