Please join us on Monday, October 16, at USNH, 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden.

This month, our guest speaker will be State Representative Josh Elliott. Josh is one of the few openly secular politicians in the United States. Here is his official biography:

“Josh Elliott is serving his first term as State Representative in the Connecticut General Assembly for the 88th District, in Hamden.

“Josh grew up in Connecticut and attended high school in Hamden. After graduating from Ithaca College with a B.A. in sociology, he went on to obtain his J.D. at Quinnipiac School of Law.

“Josh has long been involved in local and state community efforts. Since 1995, he has volunteered his time for Guiding Eyes for the Blind and from 2015 to 2016, he was an organizer for the Bernie Sanders presidential campaign.

“With his mom, he operates two family-run natural food stores, Thyme & Season in Hamden and The Common Bond Market in Shelton.

“Elliott is currently serving as Vice Chair of the Finance, Revenue and Bonding Committee and is also on the Energy and Technology Committee, the Higher Education and Employment Advancement Committee and the Committee on Children.”

The evening will start at 7:00 p.m. with conversation and refreshments. Josh will begin his presentation after brief announcements at 7:30 p.m. There will be plenty of time for questions. Come with a friend!

Our book for October is "American War: A Novel" by Omar El Akkad. Join us for the discussion at 2:00 p.m. on Saturday, October 21, at 700 Hartford Turnpike in Hamden.

Dinner and Discussion: Mass Shootings & Perceived Risk

There has been another mass shooting. It seems like more of the same: same arguments, entrenched opinions, everybody shouting and pointing fingers and nobody really thinking about the issues. Here are people who have actually changed their minds about gun control, one in each direction. One is a statistician who used to be pro-gun control: <http://tinyurl.com/y9euh6s7>. The other is a journalist who has found the data so compelling he's now in favor of gun control: <http://tinyurl.com/y7lx19c9>. There's a question as to which events should qualify to be considered a mass shooting, as the last point in this article points out: <http://tinyurl.com/ybu7orsg>. People are afraid of mass shootings like the one in Las Vegas, or Sandy Hook, or Aurora, or Virginia Tech. But the majority of people who die by gun in America are suicides, as this graphic drives home quite eloquently: <http://tinyurl.com/zq8cc25>. Suicide is in tenth place for leading cause of death in the U.S.: <http://tinyurl.com/y9ngmm4v>. Look closely at this list of injury deaths, poisoning deaths, motor vehicle traffic deaths and firearm deaths: <http://tinyurl.com/yb8l7q5y>. Do you rate their seriousness in the same order of their magnitude? Do you think we're all upset and angry over the right things? Can you justify our collective outrage (or lack thereof) with the data?
