## Monthly Meeting "Darwin Day Celebration"

With James Prosek

Friday February 19, 7:00 p.m.

This month, rather than our usual Third Monday meeting, we will be joining the statewide celebration of science and nature. CTCOR (Coalition of Reason) is honored to welcome as this year's speaker naturalist, conservationist and internationally acclaimed artist James Prosek. Prosek is a unique visual artist who is attempting to build bridges with the worlds of natural science and the arts. He has been an artist-in-residence at numerous institutions including the Yale University Art Gallery, the Isabella Stewart Gardner Museum and the Addison Gallery of American Art. In 2002 he won a Peabody Award for his documentary on 17th-century author and angler Izaak Walton and his book *The Compleat Angler*.

Prosek is the author of eleven books for both adults and children, including *Ocean Fishes* (Rizzoli, 2012) and *The Day My Mother Left* (Simon & Schuster, 2006). He has written for the *New York Times* and *National Geographic Magazine*.




### Another Darwin Day Event

## Book Discussion: "Cotton Comes to Harlem" by Chester Himes

- February 20, 2:30 p.m.

A genre novel by one of the great Black writers of the 20th Century, author Chester Himes is sometimes referred to as the "Black Raymond Chandler" because much of his writing is in the detective genre.

"Cotton Comes to Harlem" is one of [Himes's] hardest-hitting and most entertaining thrillers. Flim-flam man Deke O'Hara is no sooner out of Atlanta's state penitentiary than he's back on the streets working the scam of a lifetime. As sponsor of the Back-to-Africa movement, he's counting on a big Harlem rally to produce a massive collection --for his own private charity. But the take is hijacked by white gunmen and hidden in a bale of cotton that suddenly everyone wants to get his hands on. As NYPD detectives "Coffin Ed" Johnson and "Grave Digger" Jones piece together the complexity of the scheme, we are treated to Himes's brand of hard-boiled crime fiction at its very best. -- Amazon
