"Repatriation of Cultural Property: A Social Justice Issue"

We are excited to welcome Dr. Jackie Veninger-Robert as our speaker this month. Dr. Veninger-Robert is the Repatriation Coordinator and Indigenous Cultural Property Steward with the Connecticut Office of State Archaeology at the University of Connecticut. In addition to her repatriation responsibilities, Jackie advises students and provides instruction on issues surrounding Native American cultural property law and advocates for opportunities to decolonize museum anthropology. Before coming to UConn. Jackie worked in heritage management for tribal governments and federal agencies. She is a non-voting member of Connecticut's Native American Heritage Advisory Council. Her research interests include: archaeological ethics, heritage management and conflict archaeology.

Weather permitting, we will begin with coffee and snacks outside on the front "patio", at 6:30. You may bring light finger food to share. The program will begin inside at 7pm, following brief announcements.

Covid Protocol Reminder & Additional Programming Notes



"The Darkening Age" by Catherine Nixey

[T]he largely unknown story of how a militant religion deliberately attacked and suppressed the teachings of the Classical world, ushering in centuries of unquestioning adherence to "one true faith." Despite the long-held notion that the early Christians were meek and mild, going to their martyrs' deaths singing hymns of love and praise, the truth, as Catherine Nixey reveals, is very different. Before the advent of television, and radio before it, Newspaper columnists held sway over public opinion. One of the most notorious of these characters was the famed gossip columnist, Walter Winchell. He also successfully made the transition to radio, and then television. The impact he had on news reporting foresaw the birth and rise of right wing talk radio and operations such as Fox News and the disinformation outlets that cloud our understanding of the world and society today. As a strong advocate of the McCarthy Era, this documentary on him provides a chilling picture of the world he was instrumental in creating.
